By Sir Winston To Obtain Current By Use Of Jordan

Prime Minister Urges New Efforts For Meetings With Soviet Union

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill today stressed his desire and intention for private conversations with President Eisenhower, on the general international situation.

Sir Winston emphasized also two important, although perhaps contradictory, aspects in British foreign policy while asserting none of the broader aspects of that policy in answer to questions in the House of Commons. Labor, Conservative and Liberal members interested in the changing friendly relations with the Soviet Union, but did not add to his statement of one week ago which had allowed his government's belief in the Soviet Union's sincerity of government of the United States to be tested in the Franco-American meeting in London and France as a means of reaching international agreement.

Then, in answer to another question, the Conservative member reported his government's intention to create the European Defense Community. This six-nation alliance, which will include a reorganized Germany, has been fiercely assailed by Soviet spokesmen.

Sir Winston Churchill added that the British government would do all it could to support the European Defense Community when it came into existence, and to associate Britain with it. Sir Winston's most interesting statement today came in response to a question put by Herbert Morrison, Socialist opposition leader. He stated that the prime minister had been asked to visit the Soviet Union and take part in its proceedings. Mr. Morrison asked whether Sir Winston would meet with President Eisenhower while in the United States.

The Conservative leader said he had planned to visit the United States and that his colleagues in the cabinet had suggested a plan for him to attend a session of the United Nations.

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Israel Halts Plans To Obtain Current By Use Of Jordan

UNITED NATIONS N. Y., Oct. 27 (AP)—Israel unexpectedly altered today its support for the Jordan River hydro-electric project, and promised full cooperation with the Security Council in its effort to settle the issue.

The Israel move came after the United Nations treaty approved in Palestine, Maj. Gen. Yigal Allon, warned the council that serious trouble was being caused by the project.
